What Is Character Education?

Character education is an umbrella term loosely used to describe the teaching of children in a manner that will help them develop variously as moral, civic, good, mannered, behaved, non-bullying, healthy, critical, successful, traditional, compliant and/ or socially-acceptable beings. Character education is a national movement creating schools that foster ethical, responsible and caring young people by modelling and teaching good character through emphasis on universal values that we all share.

Character education is the development of knowledge, skills, and abilities that enable the learner to make informed and responsible choices. It involves a shared educational commitment that emphasizes the responsibilities and rewards of productive living in a global a diverse society. Character education enables students to come face to face with the realities of life. It encourages them to think critically and then act responsibly. Instructional materials, methods, and strategies, when developed into interdisciplinary curricular themes, empower teachers to create meaning while allowing students time for purposeful exploration and self-reflection. Character Education as a holistic approach

Popular wisdom holds that the best way to implement character education is through a holistic approach that integrates character development into every aspect of school life. This approach is also known as whole school reform, and it's a biggie. Character education is not an “add-on” but is instead a different way of teaching; it is a comprehensive approach that promotes core values in all phases of school life and permeates the entire school culture. It is not an imposition on already overburdened schools;

rather, it helps educators fulfil their fundamental responsibility to prepare young children for the future by laying a foundation for learning through the creation of caring, respectful school environments.

Here are some of the distinguishing features of the holistic model:

- Everything in the school is organized around the development of relationships between and among students, staff, and community.
- The school is a caring community of learners in which there is a palpable bond connecting the students, the staff, and the school.
- Social and emotional learning is emphasized as much as academic learning.
- Cooperation and collaboration among students are emphasized over competition.
- Values such as fairness, respect, and honesty are part of everyday lessons in and out of the classroom.
- Students are given ample opportunities to practice moral behaviour through activities such as service learning (see below).
- Discipline and classroom management concentrate on problem-solving rather than rewards and punishments.
- The old model of the teacher-centered classroom is abandoned in favor of democratic classrooms where teachers and students hold class meetings to build unity, establish norms, and solve problems.

Obviously, this is a best-of-all-possible-worlds approach and requires a significant commitment from the administration and teaching staff. Also, it is usually a multi-year process involving consultants, staff development, and a serious budget.

Participation in Character Education

Developing good character is first and foremost a parental responsibility but the task must also be shared with school and the broader community. As today's society provides more

and tougher challenges to raising ethical, responsible children, increasingly parents and communities are looking to schools for assistance. It is very important that each school, community reach consensus on what values should be taught in a school in order to create the sense of ownership. Early in the planning process, schools should collaborate with parents and their communities to craft a shared vision and objectives. Collectively, they should identify the core values to be taught in their school as well as the particular approaches to teaching them. A child's personality is a white paper on which both the parents and the teachers write. So, teachers, parents and community should take up the following roles for inculcating character in the children-

Role of parents

House provided the first learning environment for the child and parents are the first teachers. So they should play the following role-

- Be an ideal model of good character in the home.

- Set clear expectations for your children and hold them accountable for the actions.

- Have family meal together as often as possible.

Role of Teachers

Teacher is a sole agent of education who actually acts upon different goals and objectives explicitly. Therefore the onus lies on the shoulder of a teacher to be a role model for all the students. Following are some role of teachers-

- Be a model for the traits you want your student to exhibit.

- Try to develop a democratic classroom environment where every student can be familiar with his role.
- Involve the students in designing your programme and in planning character development related activities.
- Teacher must design various processes of the school so that every student can be involved in decision making.
- Teacher can use Cooperative learning to teach children, to work together and share academic responsibility and regard for the value of learning and work.
- Include every member of school community in character education initiative.
- Permeate the school climate with the elements of characters.
- Teacher need to encourage moral reflection through reading, writing, discussion and debate.

Role of Community

It was John Dewey, who said that education is a tri polar process, where teacher student and society are the three poles of education. He felt that community involvement, social values and social learning experiences are important requirement to enable teachers and schools to perform better. Following are some roles of community-

- Share some of the researches that shows what powerful influences parents have.
- Sponser parenting workshops.
- Tell parents how vital they are in their child's character development.
- Involve parents in the planning committee for character education.
- Plan the awareness camp to reduce the negative effect of T.V media on children moral growth.

- Establish a family resource centre including counseling corner.

How much time each day/week is needed for character education?

Character education should not be relegated to a "character education class" that is conducted periodically but should be infused throughout the structures and processes of the entire school curriculum and culture.
